National Delegates: Girls

Gianna Buscho is a 9-year Girl Scout who is a curious learner, ambitious goal-setter, hard worker, and strong voice in her community. She has a heart for service, earning many awards including the Journey Summit Award at every level as well as her Bronze and Silver Awards. She is an enthusiastic leader who takes initiative on group and individual projects, which helped her earn the Silver Torch Award as yearbook editor. Gianna's lived experience as the daughter of someone with stage 4 cancer has helped her develop a strong sense of empathy and responsibility. She strives to always be as inclusive as possible, especially focusing on advocating for equitable representation of diverse life experiences and family situations. For her Silver Award project, she worked to increase access to fresh food no matter the circumstances with special consideration of underserved communities. In 2021, as a second-year Kode with Klossy scholarship recipient, she worked with other girls nationwide to create a website to analyze data and educate others about health disparities in BIPOC communities. In her free time she enjoys backpacking as a member of GSNorCal BIG, visiting National Parks, playing flute, and reading.

Madeline Curran: As an Ambassador Girl Scout finishing my term as Alternate National Delegate, I strongly believe in the importance of girl delegates and girl voices at the National Council Session. Although we may be young, the decisions being made affect us and our experiences the most, and our

power to make changes that we have seen are needed is crucial to the Girl Scouting journeys of girl delegates to come. As an Alternate, I became familiar with the issues most important to our organization today and heard many different perspectives from across the country on what the next steps should be. I feel passionate about the proposals that we voted to pass in 2020, and am especially engaged in what's to come regarding the Gold Award scholarship committee and troop proposals to encourage declarative language. I am equipped with experience from the past two years to be knowledgeable and engaged during discussions, and am so excited to learn even more from the delegates. I hope to be able to vote for the exciting new changes being made in 2023, and to advocate for NorCal there and along the way!

Rebecca Ireland: I will be an effective National Delegate because I am passionate about Girl Scouts, and making sure everyone can get the best out of their GS experience. I am in two Girl Scout troops — Berkeley-Sakai Girl Scout Exchange, and my local troop — and I am working on my Gold Award, hosting workshops every month and motivating youth to take action.
