Intellectual Characteristics	Can read sufficiently	Can write well thought out ideas
	Learns by doing, experiencing and playing	Problem solving ability is high
	Can write neatly	Asking leading questions in search of results
	Begins to understand point of view	Can attend to an adult-directed activity for an hour, but needs action or a break
	Can last in an adult-directed activity for 45 minutes	Needs thinking breaks
	Money management is just starting	Very creative imagination
	Can learn to count up totals for cookie sales	Can brainstorm well and then put it together

Emotional Characteristics	Wants to do things herself	Can be 'sassy 'at times
	Is mostly cooperative	Can handle complex directions
	Understands rules and presses them to the limits	Needs indirect supervision and direction
	Needs indirect supervision and direction. Usually overreacts to negative correction	Usually wants her own way. Has an interest in what's "good" or "bad."
	Wants her own way, even if she knows it is wrong	Can have mood swings for no reason
	Wants approval for her work	Can be disruptive 'just for fun'
Social Characteristics	Likes to interact with peers but wants to 'act older'	Groups get smaller, cliques form
	Friends come easily	Friendships are more bonded and less out of proximity
	Is inclusive	Very independent
	Can engage in group discussion	Might not think about other's feelings when she speaks
	Is interested in making up roles	Wants do things her way and tests limits
	Is capable of compromise, waiting her turn and working out disputes with adult support	
	Shares easily	Feelings get deeply hurt when left out
